The Penang to Langkawi leg on Thursday followed, making a total of 250 miles of passage making. Starting into a freshening sea breeze, Rollin

had the fleet away into 10-12 knots on the nose. It was a sprint, more than a race, with winds reach 25 knots, and the boats started arriving in Langkawi just after seven. First Alive, then Windsikher and Millennium Racing.

Unfortunately one yacht, a small Contesa 32, Marikh, crewed by the Malaysia Navy was dismasted and was towed in by a fellow competitor.

The Royal Langkawi Yacht Club did a great job of clearing the decks and providing a fully functional marina, bar, restaurant area and operational kitchen with lots of space available for the final night's party and prizegiving.

Friday, the 27th, saw a welcome late start at 1400.

Windward / leeward courses were set in Bass Harbour with the wind switching from northeast to a solid easterly. Sarab Singh's Welbourn 52, Windsikher, continued to extend its overall lead in IRC 1.

After a spinnaker start, the two Premier division yachts were on their way down the channel. The Simonis Voogd 56, Starlight,

ran aground in one of the lower channels. Geoff Hill's Smith 72, Antipodes, stopped racing and, together with a police RIB, were

able drag the 56-footer off sideways with minimal damage.

Craig Douglas's Beneteau 47, Popeye, traded places with Gordon Ketelbey's syndicated Beneteau 44.7, Fujin, in IRC 3. Pete Waa's chartered Farr 1104, Farrgo Express, continued on its

winning ways, wrapping up the IRC 4 Class with a day to spare.

Philip Auger's Davidson 35, Sophia, posted another win in Class 5 for the first race, remaining unbeaten in five races and defending its title with ease. Dato Richard Curtis' 100-year-old Bristol Pilot Cutter, *Eveline*, skippered by Trevor Richards, was leading Class 6 by just one point but Keith Millers' Harmony 38, Sade 2, won Race 6, with Simon Read's Beneteau 350, Aeolus XC, in 2nd. It would be down to the wire on the final day shootout in Class 6.

In Class 7, Danny and Nigel's 31tch took line honours again, but couldn't convert that to handicap victory. Rolf Heemskerk's steered his chartered Stealth 11.8m, Hurricane, to two handicap wins and went directly to the top of the Multihull ladder. With



two 2nd places added to the overnight win from Penang, David Liddell's Stealth 14m, WOW, in second overall.

On Saturday, the 28th of November 2016, racing continued with good winds of 10 to 15 knots and clear skies, bringing a picture perfect ending to yet another memorable Raja Muda. One passage race for the Multihull and

2nd and 4th places for Mandrake saw them in 2nd overall and Ray Roberts TP52, Millenium Racing, slotted





By winning the last two races, Keith Miller's Harmony 38 Sade 2 climbed to the top of the Class 6 scoreboard. Simon Read's Beneteau 350, Aeolus XC, clung to 2nd with consistent placings. The Bristol Pilot Cutter, Eveline, managed to hold down a podium spot for 3rd.



3Itch took line honours in Class 7's only race of the day, but its handicap knocked them out of the running into 3rd place. Rolf Heemskerk's Hurricane took the Multihull title while David Liddell's WOW also eclipsed 3itch in the handicap stakes for



2nd overall.
